

SHOULD FEDERAL AND STATE GOVERNMENTS HAVE A DUTY OF CARE?

Our investigators believe that if the Australia Government introduces a cashless society legislation, that this could be a forerunner to reintroducing death duties.

It appears that Federal Treasurer Josh Frydenberg may try to justify the aforementioned Bill's legislation for his government's financial shortfall, due to COVID-19.

We believe, that the Federal and State Government have a duty of care to their fellow Australians, more so the State Governments who benefit enormously from land tax and stamp duty.

Hundreds of buildings throughout New South Wales (NSW) are covered in flammable material such as cheap combustible communist Chinese aluminium cladding and internal polyethylene panels.

We believe that unit purchasers, who have become victims of developers, who have used the cheap flammable communist Chinese materials, in their construction of medium to high rise apartments, should be liable to criminal prosecution by the State Government. If not, why not?

The NSW Government has refused to release a list of those developments that are deemed as high risk, citing safety concerns. In early May 2020, it was reported, flammable cladding needs urgent attention, but the NSW Government has not recognised the seriousness of the situation with only a small portion of at-risk buildings made safe, according to a parliamentary inquiry.

A NSW Upper House committee released its report on Thursday 30 April 2020 into building regulations. The report said, it was only a matter of time before NSW experienced something similar to London's catastrophic Grenfell Tower fire in 2017, which claimed 72 lives.
